Opening and Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Rich Schollmann welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order at 11:30 a.m., and led the group in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call of Trustees and Quorum Determination

With 14 of 19 trustees present, a quorum was determined.

Welcome to Visitors

A warm welcome was extended to Maggie Wickersham.

Approval of Agenda

The agenda was previously forwarded to the trustees electronically and a copy was included in the materials distributed. Amendments were proposed to the following in New Business on the agenda:

- f). Bylaws were deleted and replaced with Strategic Plan/Vision, Mission, Values, Goals and Objectives.
- g). FY20 was deleted.

Chair Schollmann asked for a motion to approve the amended agenda. (Attachment 1)

Mr. Meade Spotts **moved** to approve the agenda as amended, and Brad Antle **seconded** the motion. There was no discussion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Review and Approval of November 9, 2017 Meeting Minutes

The November 9, 2017 meeting minutes were previously sent to the trustees electronically prior to the meeting. A printed copy was available if anyone desired to review them. An amendment was proposed on page 4. The word *car* was deleted and *card* was added. Chair Schollmann asked for a motion to approve the amended minutes.

Mr. Meade Spotts **moved** to approve the minutes as presented, and Mr. Jack Lanier **seconded** the motion. There was no discussion, and the motion passed unanimously

Vietnam Veterans (1961-1975) Presentations:

In recognition of Vietnam War Veterans Day in the Commonwealth of Virginia (March 29), Secretary Hopkins, presented pins to the Vietnam Veterans who served in the military from 1961-1975. Those honored: Jim Boyd, Jack Hilgers, Jack Lanier, Tom Mulrine, Al Pianalto, Judy Reid and Frank Wickersham.

REPORTS

Board of Veterans Services (BVS)

Mr. Paige Cherry, who attended the meeting on behalf of Mr. Jim Icenhour, Chairman of Board of Veterans Services provided the BVS report. (Attachment 2) Mr. Cherry asked if there were any questions. None were posed.

Joint Leadership Council of Veterans Service Organizations (JLC)

Mr. Frank Wickersham, who attended the meeting on behalf of Ms. Marie Juliano, Chairwoman of the Joint Leadership Council provided the JLC report. (Attachment 3: Please note a page was added to the attachment that was not available at the meeting) Mr. Wickersham asked if there were any questions. None were posed.

Department of Veterans Services

Deputy Commissioner Steven Combs provided a power point presentation. He reported that of the 30 DVS benefit offices, Virginia Veterans & Family Support (VVFS) has offices located in 17 of them. Dependent on final approval of the FY19 State Budget, DVS hopes to hire a Women Veterans Coordinator and an Entrepreneurship Coordinator, The two new veterans care centers at Vint Hill (Fauquier County) and Virginia Beach will have 60% more bed capacity. Mr. Combs asked if there were any questions. None were posed.

VSF Income, Expenses, Events

Ms. Karla Boughey, VSF Executive Director, reported on the VSF income, expenditure and event report. (Attachment 4). Ms. Boughey asked if there were any questions. None were posed.

Chairman's Report

Chair Schollmann reported that he recommended Jim Boyd, Brad Antle and Matice Wright to serve on the Nominating Committee. An email will be sent to ask for nominations for Chair, 1st Vice Chair and 2nd Vice Chair. The Election for a new Chair will take place at the June meeting with the term starting on July 1, 2018.

Development Committee Report

Prior to the full Board of Trustees meeting, a Development Committee meeting was held. The Development Chair, Frank Finelli, reported on what was discussed by the members of the committee. While revenue is down, the committee believes this is an excellent time to reach out to the donor base to express our appreciation and provide details on how donations are spent. A donor list was made available and it was noted that there have been ups and downs regarding donations made throughout the years from key donors. With the data provided, Chair Finelli has asked each trustee to identify 3-5 donors to make a personal appeal on behalf of VSF. A draft letter was provided for members to review and offer their input. Chair Finelli also requested that all members review the 8 slide presentation and offer any edits to help illustrate the overview of VSF. Chair Finelli believes a key area in generating funds is to solicit donations for the VSF general fund so that donations can be used where they are most needed.

Finance Committee Report

Prior to the full Board of Trustees meeting, a Finance Committee meeting was held at the same time of the Development Committee meeting. The Finance Chair, Walter Stosch, reported on what was discussed and recommendations that were approved by members of the committee. In the code it is stated that the responsibility of all board members are not only to honor restrictions made by the donor, but to also be prudent managers of how funds are spent. The Finance Committee is tasked with establishing the various accounts, an accounting system, internal controls and relationships with external agencies such as the Auditors of Public Accounts (APA). Another important factor is establishing a strong collaborative relationship between DVS and VSF. The most recently signed MOU was distributed to demonstrate how the 2 agencies must work together to achieve success.

Chair Stosch asked that the following recommendations that were approved by the Finance Committee be considered:

- 1). To establish a Reserve Fund of \$800,000, basically hold at least the sum of a one year budget
- 2). Lift the lower travel rate currently paid to VSF Board members and increase that the rate to the amount other boards are receiving. Ms. Davidson provided the wording that would be in line with state travel policies. To lift the restrictions on VSF trustees receiving the lower mileage rate automatically and propose the VSF trustees be reimbursed for mileage in compliance with state travel regulations as other DVS support boards are receiving.

Review of FY18 Second Quarter Financial Report

Ms. Tammy Davidson, DVS Director of Finance, provided the financial review of the FY18 Second Quarter report. (Attachment 5). Ms. Davidson asked if there were any questions. None were posed.

Policy and Bylaws Committee Report

Mr. Jack Hilgers presented a follow-up report from the one presented at the November 9, 2017 Board of Trustees meeting (Attachment 6). Mr. Hilgers presented the proposed changes to the Strategic Plan/Vision, Mission, Values, Goals and Objectives. Mr. Hilgers asked if there were any questions. None were posed.

A working lunch was provided.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

FY18 Budget Adjustments, if required

Ms. Tammy Davidson, DVS Director of Finance, reported that there were no adjustments to the FY18 budget.

Overview of DVS-related budget and 2018 legislation

Deputy Commissioner Steven Combs presented a budget summary as of April 11, 2018. The information presented is based on the assumption that the same budget will be introduced in Special Session 1 as in the regular session (Attachment 7). Deputy Commissioner Combs asked if there were any questions. None were posed.

DVS FY19/FY20 NFF Requirements for VSF donated funds

Deputy Commissioner Steven Combs presented the DVS request for allocation of funds from Veterans Services Fund – FY19 and the DVS request for Veterans Services Foundation Fundraising Support for FY20 (Attachment 8). The total for the DVS FY19 Requested Allocation revisions show a decrease in all programs from the approved FY19 budget except for VETE. An additional \$25,000 was requested to cover costs of a new website for V3 (\$80,000) and new database (\$60,000) to improve resources for transitioning veterans looking for jobs.

Other Unfinished Business

Chair Schollmann asked if there was any unfinished business. None was posed.

Chair Schollmann called for a motion to approve the Nominating Committee. Mr. Al Pianalto made the motion, and Mr. Tom Mulrine seconded the motion. There was no discussion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Chair Schollmann called for a motion to reimburse VSF trustees for mileage in compliance with state travel regulations as other DVS support boards are receiving. Senator Walter Stosch made the motion, and Mr. Meade Spotts seconded the motion. There was no discussion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Chair Schollmann called for a motion to allocate \$800,000 in reserve. Senator Walter Stosch made the motion and Mr. Al Pianalto seconded the motion. There was a discussion to answer various questions and once the discussion concluded, the motion passed unanimously.

Approval of the FY18 Second Quarter Financial Report

Chair Schollmann called for a motion to approve the 2nd Quarter Financial Report. Mr. Meade Spotts made the motion, and Mr. Jim Boyd seconded the motion. There was no discussion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Approval of the FY18 Budget Adjustments, if required

Approval of Strategic Plan revisions, if required

Chair Schollmann called for a motion to approve the proposed revisions to the Strategic Plan/Vision, Mission, Values, Goals and Objectives. Mr. Frank Finelli made the motion and Mr. John Lesinski seconded the motion. There was no discussion and the motion passed unanimously.

Approval of DVS FY19 Allocation Revisions, if required

Chair Schollmann called for a motion to approve the revisions presented by Deputy Commissioner Combs. Mr. Meade Spotts made the motion and Mr. Jim Boyd seconded the motion. During the discussion, Senator Walter Stosch made a substitute motion request that DVS come forward at the June meeting with a high/low budget request that sets priorities on spending based on revenue forecasting. Mr. Meade Spotts seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. Further discussion occurred and Mr. Brad Antle made a motion to amend the approved FY19 budget adjusting the VVFS fund to \$400,000 and adding \$25,000 to the V-3 fund. Mr. Meade Spotts seconded the motion. There was no further discussion and the motion passed unanimously.

Public Comment Period

Chair Schollmann asked if there was any public comment. No members of the public were present.

Adjournment

Chair Schollmann called for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Mr. Meade Spotts made the motion to adjourn the meeting and Mr. Brad Antle seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously without discussion. The meeting adjourned at 1:50 pm.

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The Board of Veterans Services (BVS) met on November 16, 2017 at the Petersburg Freedom Support Center in Petersburg, VA. At that meeting we elected Col. Michael Dick, USMC (Ret.), as our new vice chair.

We also voted unanimously to support the Veteran Entrepreneurship Working Group's final report, as presented by chair Nick Kesler. We recommended to Commissioner Newby that DVS work to create a veteran entrepreneurship coordinator. Commissioner Newby accepted the letter and stated that the agency did request funding and Governor McAuliffe in his final budget allocated funding. Delegate Kathleen Murphy, the Women Veterans working group chair, also advocated during Session for the funding for a women veterans coordinator. As the budget is not yet final, we do not have a final report to give VSF on either position.

VSF BYLAWS AND POLICY REVISION COMMITTEE REPORT March 29, 2018

This is a follow-up report from the one presented at the November 9, 2017 Board of Trustees meeting. Committee work by Jack Hilgers and Al Pianalto continues on the VSF Bylaws and the 11 Joint VSF-DVS Policies.

Common Terminology. Use common terms for the Foundation and the Department in all Joint VSF-DVS documents has been expanded to include terminology used by the Virginia Code Commission as contained in Attachment I – Virginia Code Commission List of Technical Changes.

Bylaws. At the November 9, 2017 meeting, the Committee requested input to the VSF mission and the development of a brief, concise "mission statement." As a result of suggestions by several members, the VSF Vision, Mission, Values, and Objectives were modified (highlighted) as contained in the revised Strategic Planning Appendix at Attachment 2. The Committee would appreciate the Trustee's concurrence with the changes proposed in Attachment 2 – VSF Strategic Planning Appendix 3, Vision, Mission, Values, Goals, and Objectives.

The Bylaws were reviewed by the Office of the Attorney General. While there were several technical changes that do not alter the content, a few issues arose. These issues affected who should be considered VSF Board Officers, compensation of VSF agents and advisors, and the authority of the VSF Executive Committee. We anticipate that the issues will be resolved to the satisfaction of all concerned. The Bylaws will be an action item at the next meeting in June.

The remaining changes proposed by the Committee at the November 9, 2017 meeting mainly reflect: (1) additional Code requirements that were not covered in the previous update; (2) a requirement that VSF have a FOIA officer who will be the Executive Director; (3) some rewording standardizing the use of VSF and DVS to conform with common use in the Joint Policies; (4) and rewording of early sections of the text that could stand clarification.

Joint Policies. Due to a great deal of redundancy in the Policies and after discussion, the Committee recommends their being combined in accordance with VSF tasks set forth in the Code in the order in which they may be performed; accepting and raising revenue – fundraising, fund administration, and providing funding for veterans programs – allocations for expenditure. It also was noted at the November 9, 2017 meeting that elements of each of the three VSF functions existed in all of the policies and these had to be reorganized into more consistent formats. Also, care needed to be taken to not reduce policies to the extent that we understand them but other readers may need greater explanation. Policies basically are manuals for both direction and education of the reader.

The Committee recommended reorganization as follows:

Policy 1 (Coordination between VSF, DVS, BVS, and JLC), retain and update

Policy 2 (Foundation Operations), retain and update

Policy 3 (Accepting and Raising Revenue), update and combine policies 3 and 5 and include accepting and raising revenue and in-kind donations contained in other policies

Policy 4 (Fund Administration), update and combine policies 4, 9, and 10 and include administration contained in other policies

Policy 5 (Fund Allocation and Expenditures), new policy 5 containing policies 6, 6A, 7, and 8 and include providing funding for expenditures contained in other policies

Policy 6, new policy 6 containing policy 11 on Planned Giving updated.

The Committee has revised policies 1, and 2. New policy 3 has been put on hold pending clarification of solicitation of sponsorships. New policies 4 and 5 have been delayed awaiting the outcome of several VSF-DVS initiatives and issues yet to be resolved. The Committee believes that the policies should be presented to the Board for approval as a package and not individually in order that they can be evaluated as a whole and not piecemeal.

Action Requested. The Committee would appreciate approval of the changes proposed in the Strategic Planning Document VSF Vision, Mission, Values, Goals and Objectives.

VETERANS SERVICES FOUNDATION (VSF) STRATEGIC PLANNING APPENDIX 3 VSF VISION, MISSION, VALUES, GOALS, AND OBJECTIVES

VISION (Where the Foundation is headed and what keeps the Foundation moving forward even against discouraging odds.)

"The Foundation's vision is to advance the common good for Virginia-domiciled veterans and their dependents through providing a vibrant, growing, and responsible philanthropic organization, supporting the Commonwealth in being viewed as among the best states in the nation for support of veterans and their families."

By "common good" the Foundation means the total sum of the conditions that enhance veterans' community members' quality of life. These achievements have a shared nature that goes beyond individual benefits. [As identified by the VSF Board on 4/13/06.]

Though "veterans" and their families are the primary focus of the Foundation, it also appreciates the need to increase recognition of the role played by those returning from combat who will become future veterans as defined by the US Code. [As identified by the VSF Board on 4/13/06.]

The Foundation sees itself as part of a broad, veterans based, philanthropic community that may contribute to this vision. The Foundation aims to be an important, accountable leader in Virginia for reaching this vision. The Foundation is a means to an end, not an end in and of itself.

By comparison, see the Department of Veterans Services vision statement (2014). "Become the benchmark for the delivery of quality veterans programs at the state level and help ensure Virginia veterans receive the federal benefits to which they are entitled."

MISSION (The reason the Foundation exists; what it is trying to do.)

"The Virginia Veterans Foundation will administer and develop resources to provide supplemental sustainable revenue for the Veterans Services Fund for veterans' services and programs, and work with the Department of Veterans Services and supporting organizations to assure veterans' services and programs are enhanced." [Approved by the VSF Board on 11/15/07. This is a capsulation of two Foundation goals identified by the Board on 4/13/06; (1) develop programs that supplement and complement other veterans efforts, (2) and provide a dedicated reliable funding stream for veterans programs.] By comparison, the Code of Virginia (§ 2.2-2715.A, effective July 1, 2008) states that, "The Foundation shall (i) administer the Veterans Services Fund (the Fund), (ii) provide funding for veterans services and programs in the Commonwealth through the Fund, and (iii) raise revenue from all sources including private source fundraising to support the Fund." It subsequently was modified in 2016 to include raising and accepting of funds

Subsequent evaluation of the original Foundation mission indicated that it specifically did not recognize fundraising and that the Fund could not guarantee truly sustainable revenue. Accordingly, the Board unanimously approved a revision to the mission on May 4, 2011 as follows: "The Virginia Veterans Services Foundation will administer and develop fundraising and other resources to provide supplemental, revenue for the Veterans Services Fund for veterans' services and programs, and work with the Department of Veterans Services and supporting organizations to assure veterans services programs are enhanced.

At the Foundation Board meeting of November 9, 2017, the Board desired to revisit the Foundation Mission in view of the statutory obligation to administer the Fund, provide funding for veterans services and programs, and raise and accept revenue from all sources. Accordingly, the following mission was suggested: The Virginia Veterans Services Foundation shall raise revenue from all sources, administer the Veterans Services Fund, and provide funds for veterans' services and programs in Virginia. Also the need for a clear, concise, and useful "mission statement" that is short and inspiring was desired. The following mission statement is proposed: "Raise, administer, and allocate funds to support Virginia's veterans and their families." The Foundation and the acceptance of revenue are implied and the specification of families is contained in the reason the Foundation was established (§ 2.2-2715.A.). The mechanics of fund distribution are contained in the Authority Foundation (§2.2-2716) and not required.

By comparison, the Department of Veterans Services mission statement (2014) is: "The Department of Veterans Services serves Virginia's veterans and their beneficiaries by ensuring they receive the benefits, support, quality care, and recognition they have earned through service and sacrifice."

VALUES (How the Foundation goes about what it is trying to do; i.e., its mission.)

Articulation of values provides direction, ways of choosing among competing priorities, and guidelines about how people work together.

To pursue its vision and carry out its mission, the Foundation will be a citizen member organization with diverse leadership that helps provide effective, responsible, and cooperative veterans' philanthropic initiatives in support of the common good of Virginia's veterans and their families. The foregoing is enhanced by the Code of Virginia Requirement (§ 2-2-2715.B) that "A majority of the trustees shall be active or retired chairmen, chief executive officers, or chief financial officers for large private corporations or nonprofit organizations or individuals who have extensive fundraising experience in the private sector. Trustees shall, in so far as possible, be veterans. Each appointing authority shall endeavor to ensure a balanced geographical representation on the Board to facilitate fundraising efforts across the state."

The following supporting individual and collective supporting values should be considered:

Vision and Leadership – the ability to see the big picture and the courage to set direction to achieve the

Foundation's mission and pursue its vision.

Stewardship – the integrity to serve the interests and pursue the Foundation's goals, as well as the interests of the public and intended Foundation beneficiaries,

Knowledge - ongoing pursuit of learning to understand the Foundation's constituents, and practice operational, organizational, and managerial acuteness.

Diligence — dedication and commitment to fulfilling the Foundation's vision, mission, goals, and objectives.

Collegiality — having the sincere desire and respectful attitude toward constituents and colleagues views.

[Application for much of the above construct is both an individual and an organization responsibility and is extended to the Foundation's vision and mission.]

In contrast, the Department of Veterans Services values (2014) are organizational and follow:

- Service Provide exemplary service to Virginia's veterans and their families
- Dedication Bring an enduring commitment to helping Virginia's veterans and their families
- Excellence Be the best at what we do
- Innovation Seek new and better ways to reach and serve Virginia's veterans and their families
- Transparency Communicate with all stakeholders in a direct and sincere manner
- Stewardship Support a climate of ownership at the lowest possible level

FOUNDATION GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Background. Goals, per se, are measurable performance indicators. Objectives are measurable subsets of goals. There are two types of goals, activities and outcomes. Activities measure the internal mechanics or the substance and level of activity within a program. Outcome goals measure the final intended consequences of a program. There also are bridging goals that connect activities to outcomes. Whatever type, the goal must satisfy three criteria: (1) contain only one idea; (2) be distinct from every other goal; and (3) use action verbs (e.g., increase, improve, reduce). (Thomas, 2005)

Another way of establishing goals and objectives is for them to be;

Important to the Foundation,

Hierarchical (prioritized),

Attainable (within the Foundation's capacity and capability),

Internally consistent,

Measurable or quantifiable.

Examples of Foundation Goals and Objectives for Consideration in FY07-08. The chart at Annex 1 provides examples of goals and objectives for nonprofit organizations. A full analysis and adoption of VSF goals and objectives should be part of the strategic planning process. The chart was derived from Kaplin 2001, with permission of United Way of Rhode Island. The items with asterisks were added by the VSF Board Action Plan Committee in November 2007.

Foundation Goals and Objectives FY16 and FY17. The evolving Goals and objectives had their genesis at the August 2008 trustees meeting, based on the information contained in Appendix 1, and have evolved to their current state as a work in progress. They are not listed here, but are available in the current VSF board minutes. They perceptively focus on four critical elements contained in Annex 1; Fund Oversight and Management, Community Building, Customer Satisfaction, and Veterans Satisfaction. The latter should encompass veterans families. Though some may consider Internal Processes the exclusive purview of the Executive Director, in fact, it requires the entire Foundation team working together to meet these objectives and others that have been identified.
